SELECTION FOR A SOLID FOUNDATION

CATTLE FOOT AND LEG SCORING SYSTEMS


Over the years, an increasing occurrence of lameness across all sectors of beef cattle production has lead to a larger focus on foot and leg traits. Improving foot and leg quality through proper selection can affect an animal's ability to move more efficiently, significantly increasing the longevity of that animal in your herd. While input costs continue to rise, longevity can help reduce the cost of our replacement females.


FOOT ANGLE

Foot angle is measured as the degree of angularity from the toe and the base of the foot to the base of the coronary band and hairline. Heel depth plays a significant role in foot angle. A score on the low end of the scale shows an extremely straight and rigid pastern and hoof, where a high score represents an extremely shallow heel and long claw which is commonly associated with weak pasterns. When scoring our cattle, we want to make sure to score the worst foot of each animal.

CLAW SHAPE

Claw shape is described by the relative size and curvature of the claws/toes on an individual foot. Where the distance between claws serves to indicate the level of divergence. A low score would represent an extremely open and divergent claw set, whereas a high score would represent an extreme scissor or corkscrew claw with noticeable curling of one or both claws. Again, score the animal's worst foot.





REAR LEG SIDE VIEW

When we look at the side view of the animal's rear leg we are evaluating the degree of angularity from the stifle to the hock and down to the pastern. Scoring will represent an extremely straight and post-legged animal with little to no angle or set to the hock all the way to an animal with an extreme amount of set or angle to the hock also known as being sickle hocked.

As with any selection criteria determining our culling decisions, the most economical selection occurs when animals with extreme and or undesirable scores are identified and culled. If you identify any of the animals in your herd as a 1 or 9 on one or more of these scoring systems, that animal is a cull animal. Those cattle scoring a 2 or 8 should be identified as possible culls depending on your individual needs.
